## INTRODUCTION

Given the escalating challenges associated with global food crises, climate change, and the deterioration of natural resources, the development of a sustainable and resilient agricultural system is of critical importance. In Africa, especially within vulnerable regions, these issues significantly strain agricultural production systems, threatening food security, rural livelihoods, and environmental balance.

Agroecology and organic agriculture have become essential strategies for addressing these challenges. These approaches emphasize farming practices that respect ecosystems, promote biodiversity, and minimize reliance on chemical inputs. 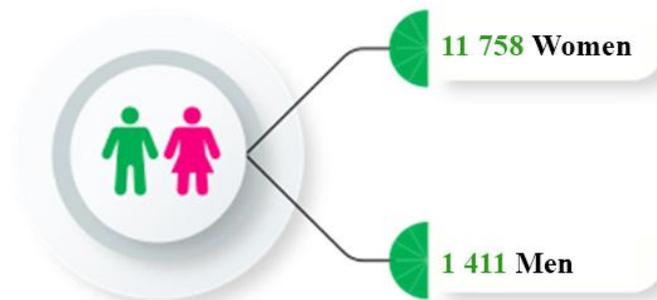

# ACTIVITIES IMPLEMENTED IN 2024 BY STRATEGIC AXES

## Strategic axe 1: Information / Awareness / Outreach / Capacity Building

### Information and digital knowledge dissemination to target audiences

In 2024, in an increasingly connected world, AGRECOL Afrique enhanced its digital presence by adopting innovative Information and Communication Technologies (ICT). This digital expansion allowed the NGO to effectively disseminate information, foster awareness, facilitate networking, and improve communication among stakeholders within the Ecological and Organic Agriculture (EOA) value chains. It highlighted critical issues such as agroecology, food sovereignty, and climate change resilience. Through constructive dialogue and participatory initiatives, stakeholders contributed to the promotion of agroecological and organic practices and techniques. Furthermore, this approach has served to showcase successful EOA experiences and innovations in product transformation, thereby inspiring new initiatives across national, local, and regional contexts. Digitalization has played—and continues to play—a crucial role in AGRECOL Afrique's mission, supporting the transition to more sustainable and resilient agricultural and food systems.

The following actions were carried out:

- Enhancement of AGRECOL Afrique's online presence and visibility
- Development and dissemination of content
- Implementation of targeted awareness campaigns under the slogan “I practice agroecology”
- Creation of online communities
- Organisation of hybrid and virtual events
- Capacity building of staff in digital tools
- Launch of a digital platform for the sale of organic products

### Training and capacity building for value chain stakeholders in EOA

Training represents a fundamental component of AGRECOL Afrique's strategic vision and continues to be a top priority. In 2024, several training programs were conducted with the support of technical and financial partners. The primary objective of these initiatives is to enhance the capacity of beneficiaries by providing targeted support, thereby fostering the development of knowledge, practices and experiences in EOA as well as in the social and solidarity economy.

The training sessions conducted encompassed the following areas:

- Processing of fruits, vegetables, and grains,
- Techniques for conserving and valorising local seeds,
- Methods for natural bouillon production,
- Water and bleach production,
- Culinary arts,
- Production of fortified flour for children,
- Administrative and financial management,
- Impacts of climate change on agriculture,
- Strategic planning in agriculture,
- Projected income statement.

These training activities directly reached **563 direct beneficiaries across 33 localities**, resulting in the production of **720.5 kg of goods** (e.g., fortified flour, grains). A total of **27 training sessions** were conducted in 2024.

Participants comprised **38.54% men and 60.46% women**, with a strong **focus on youth, who represented 58% of the beneficiaries**. Additionally, **more than 350 new trainers** were trained. Each trainer is expected to support an average of **50 farmers**, thereby potentially impacting **17,500 indirect beneficiaries**.

## Enhancing awareness among key stakeholders within the EOA value chain

Raising awareness among stakeholders is one of AGRECOL Afrique's major priorities. This approach is articulated through a strategic framework designed to guide targeted actions with the objective of enhancing the effectiveness of the implemented measures. These efforts aim to spread knowledge, promote good practices, and strengthen community awareness and resilience in line with EOA principles.

Throughout these activities, it has become apparent that stakeholders demonstrate strong interest in adopting and maintaining these practices. As a result, awareness-raising has emerged as one of the key mechanisms implemented by AGRECOL Afrique to provide sustainable support to grassroots communities.

In 2024, AGRECOL Afrique carried out several awareness initiatives within its programs, focusing on:

- Promoting local consumption
- Hosting workshops on Participatory Guarantee Systems (PGS), e.g., Bio Sénégal label and EOA actors in Gambia
- Encouraging value chain actors to organic agriculture network in agroecological zones of Senegal
- Conducting awareness sessions on strategies to combat hunger and debt
- Establishing feedback mechanisms within solidarity calabash networks
- Organising field visits and exchange sessions
- Hosting mornings dedicated to agroecology awareness

These activities were conducted in five West African countries (Nigeria, Benin, Mali, The Gambia, and Senegal) and involved 99 localities. In total, **79 awareness sessions** were conducted, engaging **1 578 direct participants**, of whom **1 265 were women** (80,16%).

## Strategic axe 2: Value chain and market development

Developing agroecological and organic value chains is one of the strategic pillars of AGRECOL Afrique. Accordingly, in 2024, all projects and programs were mobilised to strengthen these value chains. This approach also facilitated the exchange of experiences and the dissemination of best practices in EOA. Its main goal is to promote sustainable and profitable relationships between producers, processors, traders, and consumers, thereby fostering professional collaborations among stakeholders in a manner that is both sustainable and economically viable. Ultimately, this contributes to the overall development of the market and the EOA sector.

Key activities included:

- Organisation of organic weekends
- Organisation of agroecological mornings
- Organisation of group purchases
- Support of solidarity calabashes networks
- Organisation of site visits
- Support for market garden production

- Processing of grains, fruits, vegetables and eco-friendly cleaning products

These initiatives resulted in **22 operations and four agroecological mornings**, engaging a total of **240 direct actors**, of whom **56.25% were women**. Moreover, **three awareness sessions** dedicated specifically to the development of the value chain were organised to broaden the network of EOA stakeholders. Additionally, **109 professional relationships were established, thereby contributing to the structuring and sustainability of these exchanges.**

Moreover, the solidarity calabashes networks are consolidated under a central platform known as the Alliance for the Development of Solidarity Calabashes (ADECAS). This federal network encompasses all communal and local solidarity calabash networks. Supported by its partners (members, calabashes, networks, support organisations, ADC, etc.), ADECAS’s principal objective is to promote economic, social, and solidarity-based development within communities.

This alliance plays a key role in the management of network resources, thereby enhancing the efficacy of their actions and operations. Through effective resource management, ADECAS has achieved a significant annual profit, as demonstrated in the table below:

### Strategic axe 3: Nutrition

The nutritional component plays a significant role among AGRECOL Afrique's strategic priorities, with a particular focus on early childhood. Consequently, the nutritional status of children aged 0 to 5 years is closely monitored. Their mothers, who are members of the solidarity calabashes networks, regularly participate in specialized sessions designed to improve their culinary skills and expand their knowledge of child nutrition.

Principal activities carried out include:

- Evaluation of children's nutritional status
- Culinary arts training
- Production of fortified flour for children
- Days on promotion of local foods
- Culinary competitions
- Educational discussion sessions

The implementation of these activities led to **10 home visits and 10 nutritional assessment sessions**, involving a total of **577 children**. Among them, **504 were in a normal nutritional state, 68 were at risk, and 5 were in a critical condition**. These findings underscore the vital importance of nutrition for both mothers and children, who actively participated in the program and recognized its value in improving household well-being.

### Strategic axe 4: Participatory innovation development

Participatory development constitutes a fundamental approach within international community development, emphasizing the active engagement of local populations in shaping their own futures. This methodology is based on their active participation in the decision-making processes related to the interventions that concern them. AGRECOL Afrique, serving as the secretariat for the Prolinnova Senegal project, which promotes local innovations, organised three steering committee meetings in 2024. These sessions provided members to deliberate on key strategic directions, including:

- Progress of the PROLIGEAFA project
- Identification of new innovations
- Characterization of innovations
- Experimentation of innovations
- Dissemination of innovations
- Hosting of the International Partners Workshop (IPW)
- Mobilisation of funding for new projects

### Strategic axe 5 : Knowledge management in organic agriculture

In alignment with its strategic vision, AGRECOL Afrique emphasizes the importance of knowledge management in Organic Agriculture (OA). This focus serves as a fundamental component of sustainable agricultural practices development, grounded in the principles of health, ecology, fairness, and care.

In collaboration with Enda Pronat, AGRECOL Afrique has implemented several capacity-building activities to equip stakeholders with the necessary knowledge and tools to enhance yields and improve product quality. These activities include:

- Raising awareness regarding the importance of organic agriculture
- Compost production
- Production and utilisation of biofertilizers and biopesticide
- Knowledge-sharing workshops
- Documentation of best practices

These actions produced significant technical, organisational, and environmental outcomes.

## Strategic axe 6: Participatory Guarantee System (PGS) Certification

The Participatory Guarantee System (PGS), or local certification, was introduced as an affordable alternative to third-party certification, which has previously been inaccessible to small-scale producers. PGS now serves as a reliable tool for ensuring traceability and guaranteeing the quality of agroecological and organic products, thereby strengthening consumer confidence and promoting local consumption.

Certification through PGS affirms the authenticity of ecological and organic products, grounded in specific standards for organic agriculture. The PGS delineates the certification process and criteria, as well as establishing transparency standards.

Through its intervention strategy, AGRECOL Afrique and its partners supported alternative PGS certification initiatives in West Africa. These actions have aimed to strengthen the impact of the PGS in the region and justify the implementation of a series of activities throughout 2024. These activities are as follows:

1. Awareness sessions on PGS certification in agroecological zones
2. Training sessions on the certification specifications (e.g., BIO SENEGAL label)
3. PGS local certification of farms in Senegal, Mali, Benin, and Nigeria
4. A sub-regional advocacy workshop for the institutionalization of PGS in West Africa

As a result of these activities, **29 awareness sessions were held across 25 localities** in West Africa, engaging **713 participants, of whom 47.76% were women. A total of 330 family farms were certified** through the efforts of **four certification groups**.

## Strategic axe 7: Advocacy and Lobbying

In a context where political and economic decisions have significant social impacts, advocacy and lobbying constitute crucial tools for amplifying the voices of citizens, organisations, and interest groups. While advocacy serves to promote causes, protect rights and influence public and international policies through peaceful and participatory approaches, lobbying facilitates strategic dialogue with decision-makers to shape legislation and regulations in favour of specific interests. These two mechanisms play a key role in fostering participatory development and defending collective or sectoral issues.

In 2024, AGRECOL Afrique actively prioritized advocacy and lobbying efforts to gain recognition for agroecology and organic agriculture across West Africa. Our initiatives aimed to raise awareness among policymakers, influence public policy, and mobilise the necessary resources for a sustainable agroecological transition. The main strategic objectives included:

1. Promoting agroecology integration in national and regional public policies
2. Strengthening dialogue among key stakeholders (farmers, public institutions, technical and financial partners)
3. Mobilising sustainable funding for large-scale agroecological initiatives
4. Highlighting the links between agroecology, food sovereignty, and climate resilience in national and international forums.

### **Key Actions implemented in 2024**

- Participation in political and strategic frameworks, notably as a member of the technical committee for developing Senegal's ecological and organic agriculture strategy.
- Active involvement in regional platforms through the participation in forums and workshops, such as the West African conference co-organised by ECOWAS, WAfRoNet, and Action Aid in Abuja.
- Engagement in over 100 multi-stakeholder dialogues, involving representatives from ministries, producer organisations, NGOs, and the private sector to discuss the challenges and opportunities of agroecology.
- Representation at international conferences, including COP28, to amplify the voice of agroecological producers on the global climate agenda.

### **Advocacy with local policymakers**

- Meetings with mayors and municipal councils within intervention zones to incorporate agroecology and organic agriculture into local development strategies.
- Production and dissemination of advocacy materials highlighting the socio-economic and environmental benefits of agroecology.
- Mobilisation of funding for agroecological projects.
- Policy recognition of agroecology through official commitments and incentive measures for agroecological and organic producers.
- Strengthening strategic alliances to broaden AGRECOL Afrique's partner network.
- Increased visibility of agroecological issues through targeted advocacy actions.

## Partnerships

In 2024, AGRECOL Afrique expanded and diversified its network of partnerships to support the development of agroecology and organic agriculture in Senegal and the wider region. These collaborations—comprising institutional, technical, financial, and community stakeholders—contributed to scaling existing initiatives and enhancing their overall impact.

### Institutional partners

#### Government agencies and local authorities:

The organisation established partnerships with ministries of agriculture, livestock, cooperatives, and environment to integrate agroecology into public policy frameworks. Additionally, collaborations with municipalities facilitated the development of territorial agroecological projects, particularly in rural and peri-urban areas.

#### Regional bodies :

AGRECOL Afrique strengthened cooperation with ECOWAS and WAFRoNet to promote conducive regulatory environments supporting organic agriculture and agroecology. Notably, AGRECOL Afrique's coordinator was elected President of WAFRoNet during the general assembly in Abuja on October 23, 2024.

### Technical partners

#### Research institutions and universities:

Partnerships with research centers involved joint projects aimed to adapt agroecological practices to local contexts and evaluate their impact. Collaborative efforts with universities focused on knowledge sharing to train the next generation of agronomists and development practitioners.

#### NGOs and local associations:

The organisation reinforced synergies with partner NGOs to pool resources and lead joint awareness campaigns emphasizing food sovereignty and climate resilience.

### Financial and strategic stakeholders

#### Funders:

- Collaboration with international institutions to finance agroecological and climate adaptation projects.
- Partnerships with private foundations to support training, awareness, and the promotion of organic products.

#### Private sector:

- Engagement with agri-food companies to structure sustainable, certified organic value chains.
- Support for financing local agro-entrepreneurs to encourage sustainable practices.

## Impact of actions implemented in 2024

Over several years, AGRECOL Afrique, in collaboration with its partners, has undertaken a range of initiatives aimed at developing ecological and organic agriculture. These interventions, centered on capacity-building, support for local projects, and advocacy efforts, have had notable impacts at multiple levels, including:

- An increase in the field-level activities
- Enhancement of technical and institutional capacities
- Improved mobilisation of financial resources
- Expansion of a network of committed actors dedicated to agroecological transition and environmental sustainability across Africa
- Strengthening resilience within rural community
- Active inclusion of women and youth
- Promotion of sustainability of development initiatives
- Facilitation of enduring improvements in the daily lives of beneficiaries
- Reinforcement of trust between stakeholders

In 2024, AGRECOL Afrique reaffirmed its position as a catalyst for the advancement of resilient, equitable, and sustainable agriculture through the consolidation of knowledge and the cultivation of strategic partnerships with tangible territorial impact.

## Challenges faced in 2024

### Budget constraints

In 2024, the organisation encountered various challenges, most notably budgetary limitations. These financial constraints affected the implementation of some planned activities. To address these issues, AGRECOL Afrique prioritized essential initiatives, pursued strategic partnerships, and optimized resource use. Furthermore, the organisation enhanced its fundraising efforts and diversified its funding sources to ensure the ongoing sustainability of its programs.

### Climate change adaptation

The difficulties arising from climate change prompted the organisation to undertake measures aimed at strengthening the resilience of agricultural communities. AGRECOL Afrique initiated

several projects to assist farmers in adapting to these environmental impacts, thereby reaffirming its dedication to sustainable agricultural practices.

## Outlook for 2025

- Strengthen initiatives for sustainable development of EOA
- Continue and expand training, awareness, and support for producers and local stakeholders
- Participate in major regional events
- Promote responsible food systems for social well-being
- Strengthen partnerships with other organisations
- Share knowledge, resources, and strategies for sustainable agriculture
- Enhance digital platforms for training and monitoring agroecological producers
- Increase youth engagement in promoting agroecology and organic agriculture, linking it with entrepreneurship
- Intensify the use of AI tools to analyse impact data and optimize future campaigns

## FINANCES: ANNUAL AND INSTITUTIONAL AUDIT

The project and program activities were predominantly financed through grants from donors such as Action de Carême Swiss, Groundswell International, Vibrant Village Foundation, and BMZ/GIZ. In 2024, the total mobilised budget amounted to 281,951,857 FCFA.

In accordance with customary practice, AGRECOL Afrique retained the services of an external audit firm to certify its 2024 financial statements. It should be noted that all received funds were meticulously allocated exclusively to operational activities.

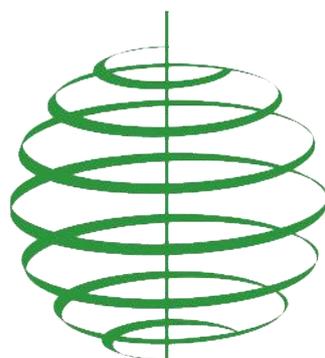
